Discussion Questions

1. Read 1 Peter 1:13 . This verse begins with "Therefore." What is the significance of this word in light of what Peter calls for in this verse? How would 1 Peter 1:13 hit different if it were the opening verse of the letter instead?
2. Read 1 Peter 1:13 and Hebrews 10:23 . What are some earthly things you are hoping in, and how might they foreshadow your eternal hope of being with Jesus?
3. Read 1 Peter 1:13 and 2 Peter 1:3. Fighting for hope in this world involves giving attention to both our physical and spiritual well-being. How might over-emphasizing one of these to the exclusion of the other be detrimental? What dangers exist when we seek naturalistic answers to problems that may have spiritual causes?
4. Read 1 Peter 1:13 and 1 Thess 5:4-11. What damage can be done when we don't defend our minds and fight for our eternal hope, but give ourselves over to the escape of worldly intoxications instead?
